A season of self-reflection



from Pastor Kobert's Desk

Lent is often known as a season of self-reflection. People of the Christian faith will often take this season to willingly remove something from their life to better themselves or to deepen their faith in Christ. It is a time that can serve as a reorientation away

from the things that draw us away from God to better shine the light of Christ that we have been given.

I certainly encourage all the faithful to seek out a practice over these next forty days that sets something aside in your life that is a distraction, or doesn't really benefit your life in any way. Instead, picking up a practice of daily prayer, scripture reading, or volunteering of time to a group that serves others. In these ways you can reflect on your life and find the places and ways that need reorientation towards what Jesus has called us to do.

Ascension, as a congregation, is also at a season if its life which requires discernment and self-reflection. The grief of a pastor leaving is very real, and one not often understood by clergy, though we do go through grief of our own when a call changes. Still, both present an opportunity for self-reflection and reorientation.

A well-used question can help to start that process of self-reflection for congregations: If Ascension were to shut its lights and lock its doors tomorrow, how long until the surrounding community notices?

Much like a personal self-reflection moment, the question seeks to tease out what the purpose of a place is. Especially when there is the absence of a called pastor. Is there community connection only because the Pastor has done it, or is there genuine connection with the whole congregation? What is the purpose of this congregation in this place? When nonmembers speak about the church, what do they have to say?

These are just a few self-reflective questions to get us started, but with each answer the congregation comes closer to being able to boldly proclaim who we are in the world, and how we live out the mission of Christ here in this place and

A message from Council President Jerry Wessel

KEEP A WATCHFUL EYE

"I urge you brothers and sisters, to keep an eye on those who cause divisions and offenses in opposition to the teachings that you have learned. Avoid them."

~ Romans 16:17

Here again, St. Paul is warning a congregation about internal opponents of what he and the other apostles taught. Our national church body, the ELCA, continues to fail to "keep an eye on" those that have agendas in conflict with Lutheran theology. I'm not a theologian, but I believe that there are many theological differences that have caused the Lutheran, Presbyterian, Methodist, United Church of Christ and Anglican denominations to be separate for the last 500 years. I've been reading about some as I do research on the Internet. I do not understand why the ELCA insists that it is okay to share pulpits with or call as our pastor someone from a non-Lutheran denomination as long as they are WOKE or radical.

For instance, we say in our bulletin each week just before Communion that, "As Lutherans we believe in the true presence of Christ in the sacrament of Holy Communion." Presbyterians do NOT believe in the true presence of Christ in the sacrament.

Lutherans believe that we are saved by grace through faith and are simultaneously saints and sinners. Presbyterians believe that believers grow in holiness by cooperating with God's grace. If you get online, you can find many differences between the various denominations. Why is it okay to worship with them or have them teach and minister to us and our youth? Why *isn't* it okay with the ELCA to call a pastor from a different Lutheran group, but okay to call a non-Lutheran?

ELCA theologians seem to believe that they need to update Lutheran theology so it is more "modern" and relevant than what the 20-25 generations of Lutheran theologians who came before them believed. The *Book of Concord* contains the three creeds, various Lutheran confessions, and Luther's Large and Small Catechisms. In the past, new pastors, when they were

Quiet times

A reflection by Nancy Jacobs

Has the cold weather made you feel cut off from the world? I know it has for me - want to sit out on my back porch in the sun ... barefoot and in a pair of shorts. I'm impatient for this weather to go away -AND SOON!! But our Lord kind of puts a kink in my wishing when He tells us to "be still" - allow yourself "quiet times."

He has limitations on my wishing ... and on my impatience. "Be still" he says again. Instead of resenting His limitations, make quiet times in your life to search for ways to better serve Him. How, you ask ... well, there many ways ... serve the church on council, teach bible study classes, volunteer to assist in the service, extend yourself into the community by helping with the food bank, check with community leaders to see if you can provide clothing, blankets, toiletries for the needy.

In this day of hurry up ... running from one action to another without stopping, we need "quiet time" to dwell on our beliefs and devotion to our Lord and to what is really important in our lives. God in many ways tells us not to spoil "quiet times" by wishing them away, but to put them to good use. So, while you sit on your back porch "be still" and know that God works within you and by you to show His love for all mankind.

in this larger community. Just as in our own personal Lenten journey we should be asking, "Does this serve Christ in our life in this place? If so, then how?"

If it does not, however, serve Christ in this place, we must do as the author of Hebrews instructs [see above] and set aside that weight and the sin that seeks to keep us from serving Christ, instead looking to Christ. During these forty days we will be reoriented to the cross of Christ, seeing his life, hearing his words, being taught how to live towards one another. These are the guides that can help this congregation to recognize who we are in this place, to live into that mission of Jesus, and to make the impact in the world that Jesus envisions.

Reflecting on this, reorienting our faces to the cross of Christ, and boldly serving the world around us will go a long way in showing a future pastor, whoever they may be, that this is a place where God is at work.■

ordained, were required to swear that they believed what the Book of Concord contained and that they would teach and preach those doctrines. Now the ELCA says, "Unqualified acceptance of the Book of Concord is not required." Apparently, it does not match the ELCA's political and social agendas. I believe that if we say we are Lutherans, we should stand for what Luther stood for.

Ascension will need to decide soon if we can continue to live in the ELCA. Our church council approved a motion in February to form a subcommittee to study ELCA issues and other Lutheran church bodies with a goal of presenting a briefing to the congregation. If you would like to be on this sub-committee, please see Bob Stathers (chairperson) or another council member.

In addition to theological problems I have with the ELCA, there are many things I would call "church governance" issues that I will write about next month. As I wrote in the last newsletter [February 2025], we need to "stay alert."

More radical changes are being considered at the national level of the ELCA. Ascension needs to be ready for them.

LESSER FESTIVALS & commemorations

March 1 George Herbert

hymnwriter, d. 1633

An excellent scholar, Herbert served briefly in the English parliament, then became a parish priest. He was known for devoted care of his parishioners, as well as for writing poetry and hymns, including "Come, my way, my truth, my life." He died at age 40.

March 2 John Wesley & Charles Wesley

d. 1791 & 1788; renewers of the church

These brothers led a revival originally intended to remain within the Church of England, one that involved frequent communion and advocacy for the poor. Except for a brief time in America, they worked in England. Charles was also a prolific hymn writer. After their deaths, their work led to the formation of the Methodist Church.

March 7 Perpetua & Felicity and companions

Martyrs at Carthage, d. 202

Vibia Perpetua was a noblewoman, and Felicity her slave, who were catechumens at Carthage, northern Africa. They, with four other catechumens, had defied the Roman emperor who had forbidden conversions to Christianity, and were put to death in the amphitheater.

March 10

Harriet Tubman, d. 1913 Sojourner Truth, d. 1883 Renewers of society

Harriet Tubman, born into slavery, helped about 300 others to escape slavery until the institution was abolished. Sojourner Truth, whose birth name was Isabella, was freed after slavery was abolished, and discerned a call to be a preacher. Taking the name Sojourner Truth, she set out on an evangelistic journey, where people found her testimony to be deeply moving.

March 12 Gregory the Great

Bishop of Rome, d. 604

Born into wealth and power, Gregory was for a time the chief administrator of the city of Rome. Giving this up for a life in the church, he was elected pope in 590. He influenced public worship through the establishment of a lectionary and prayers to correlate with the readings. Gregorian chant is named in his honor.

March 17 Patrick

Bishop, missionary to Ireland, d. 461

A native of Britain, Patrick was kidnapped by pirates at age sixteen and sold into slavery in Ireland. After a few years, he escaped, returned home, and entered the ministry. Returning to Ireland, he successfully served as a bishop and missionary there.

March 19 Joseph, Guardian of Jesus

Though the Bible tells us little about the husband of Jesus' mother Mary, we know that he was a carpenter by trade. He is also shown as being devoted both to God and to Mary and Jesus. It is assumed that he died before Jesus became an adult.

March 21 Thomas Cranmer, Bishop of Canterbury martyr, d. 1556

Cranmer's lasting achievement is contributing to and overseeing the creation of the Book of Common Prayer, which remains (in revised form) the worship book of the Anglican Communion. He was burned at the stake under Queen Mary for his support of the Protestant Reformation.

March 22 Jonathan Edwards

Teacher, missionary to Native Americans, d. 1758

A Puritan minister in Connecticut, Edwards is remembered as being a great preacher. Though his most famous sermon talks at length about hell, he was more concerned with God's love. He served both as missionary to the Housatonic people in Massachusetts, and as president of the future Princeton University.

March 24 Oscar Arnulfo Romero

Bishop of El Salvador, martyr, d. 1980

Romero was deeply concerned with injustices evident toward the poor and powerless in El Salvador, and worked forthrightly against political repression. He was assassinated while presiding at the Eucharist in a chapel near the cathedral in San Salvador.


March 25 Annunciation of Our Lord

Nine months before Christmas, the church celebrates the annunciation. In Luke, the angel Gabriel announces to Mary that she will give birth to the Son of God, and she responds, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord." Ancient scholars believed that March 25 also was the day on which creation began and was the date of Jesus' death on the cross. Thus, from the sixth to eighth centuries, March 25 was observed as New Year's Day in much of Christian Europe.

March 29 Hans Nielsen Hauge renewer of the church, d. 1824 Hauge was a layperson who wished to revitalize the church in Norway. Many professionals in the church feared his motives and influence; he was imprisoned for leading unauthorized gatherings.

March 31 John Donne poet, d. 1631

After finishing his education at Oxford University, Donne seemed headed for a career in the English public service. But a series of circumstances led him into the ordained ministry. He is well known as a writer of both secular and sacred poetry.
